



Starring opposite David Wenham, who Hayden says is "arguably Australia's most exciting up-and-coming actor of an international scale," was a dream realised and a very exciting moment in Hayden's career. A thriving cityscape provides the magnificent urban backdrop for drive-by art or over-sized installation pieces extending the gallery and museum experience into the public arena. Yes, our metropolis is a living exhibition with art in all shapes and sizes abundantly dominating street corners and building foyers throughout as part of the Public Art program. Emerging from the concrete pavement, Sebastian Di Mauro's stunning designs light up our inner-city scenery, breathing an artistic life into the City. Not confined to the sculptural and installation medium, the active graphic designer and painter has carved a name for himself both here and abroad due in part to a dedication to the craft that extends to design education. The prolific artist has held almost forty solo exhibitions since 1987 with his work included in excess of ninety group exhibitions throughout Australia, Europe and Asia. He is also Creative Director of the Queensland College of Art's (QCA) professional graphic design studio, Liveworm. As a Senior Lecturer at the QCA, Sebastian is shaping the future artistic endeavours of Brisbane - it's public art on a global scale where the artworks are the students and the pavement is the world stage.
